MPRA IS AWARDED TWO GRANTS

MPRA has recently been awarded two grants for 2019 education projects. Dominion Energy Charitable Foundation has donated \$900 to support River Day and River Camp. The Dominion Energy grant will provide funds for a live animal program, a canoe trip during camp this summer, and will fund a visit from Mr. Todkill (pictured left) . . . THE favorite station at the middle school River Day each fall.

Upon approval of the 2019 General Assembly budget, a \$500 grant will be sent to MPRA by the Chesapeake Bay Restoration Fund. The money for the fund comes from the sale of Chesapeake Bay license plates (so get one!). MPRA is one of 90 organizations and schools whose projects were recommended by a legislative committee to receive a grant. The money will be used for replacing seine nets, replacement pieces for our Enviroscape model and purchasing wildlife skins & skulls for our environmental education projects.

MPRA is an all-volunteer organization. Our major expenses are a monthly storage space rental, mailbox fees, portable toilet rentals, supplies & food for events, printing and mailing a newsletter once a year, and supplies for special projects. We appreciate the generous support from our sponsors and partners (listed on the front page). But, we especially thank the people who care about, play on and work on behalf of the rivers...you.

Thanks for being a member of this 28-year old group dedicated to the steward-ship, preservation and appreciation of the natural and cultural heritage of the Mattaponi and Pamunkey Rivers.
